DRAFT PUBLIC NOTICE (STORM SECURITIZATION)

NOTICE is hereby given, pursuant to Article IV, Section 21(D)(1) of the Louisiana Constitution, that on September 28, 2021, Cleco Power LLC ("Cleco Power"), an electric public utility supplying retail electric service to approximately 291,000 customers in twenty-four (24) parishes in the State of Louisiana through its retail business and supplying wholesale power in the States of Louisiana and Mississippi, filed with the Louisiana Public Service Commission (the "LPSC"), pursuant to Article IV, Section 21(D)(3) of the Louisiana Constitution and Title 45, Section 1226 of the Louisiana Revised Statutes, a Supplemental Application ("Supplemental Application"), which supplements Cleco Power's original application, filed with the LPSC on August 5, 2021 (the "Original Application"). The Original Application requested that the LPSC issue a Revenue Requirement Order finding that Cleco Power's storm recovery costs incurred after Hurricane Laura, Hurricane Delta, and Hurricane Zeta, and Winter Storms Uri and Viola, were prudently incurred and that the LPSC-jurisdictional share of those storm recovery costs, totaling approximately \$242.9 million, should be financed through the issuance of Storm Recovery Bonds. The amount being financed also will include approximately \$9 million in upfront bond issuance costs, plus additional future ongoing securitization financing costs. The Original Application also requested that the Revenue Requirement Order authorize Cleco Power to create a funded restricted storm reserve in the amount of approximately \$100 million for the storm-related uses and withdrawal criteria further described in the Original Application and its supporting testimony, and find that the funded restricted storm reserve should also be financed through the issuance of the Storm Recovery Bonds. The Supplemental Application re-urges the Original Application, and further requests that the LPSC authorize the establishment of a separate, additional funded restricted storm reserve in the amount of approximately \$100 million, to cover the storm recovery costs that Cleco Power expended for Hurricane Ida, which would also be financed through the issuance of the Storm Recovery Bonds. The Supplemental Application relates to and is being filed in LPSC Docket No. U-35807. The twenty-four parishes in which Cleco Power provides service are: Acadia, Allen, Avoyelles, Beauregard, Calcasieu, Catahoula, Desoto, Evangeline, Grant, Iberia, Jefferson Davis, Lasalle, Natchitoches, Rapides, Red River, Sabine, St. Landry, St. Martin, St. Mary, St. Tammany, Tangipahoa, Vermilion, Vernon and Washington.

Cleco Power is requesting that these amounts described in the Supplemental Application be recovered through storm recovery charges paid by Cleco Power's customers. Cleco Power requests that these storm recovery charges be determined by LPSC-approved rate schedules to implement the storm recovery charges. Because the actual revenue requirement will not be known until after the pricing of the Storm Recovery Bonds, it is only possible to estimate customer bills at this time. If the LPSC authorizes Cleco Power's requests in the Original Application, as supplemented by the Supplemental Application, the estimated monthly storm recovery charge for a residential bill at 1,000 kWh would be \$4.14 per month, but it

would be subject to an estimated surcredit reduction of \$0.58 per month, for an estimated net monthly storm recovery charge of \$3.56 per month.

Notice of Cleco Power's Supplemental Application will be published in the October 1, 2021, Official Bulletin of the LPSC. The Supplemental Application is being filed in LPSC Docket No. U-35807. The proposed rate change will affect all parishes served by Cleco Power. Cleco Power's Supplemental Application (including its proposed rate schedules) may be viewed in the Office of the LPSC in Baton Rouge, Louisiana and on the LPSC's website (www.lpsc.louisiana.gov), under Docket No. U-35807. This is a Request for Proposals for the COLLECTION AND TRANSPORT OF WINTER STORM DEBRIS TO THE HARRISONBURG COLLECTION SITE.

Qualified firms must submit a proposal for Service. For purposes of evaluating the proposals that are received for the service, the Town of Jonesville (Town) reserves the right to consider the direct and indirect costs and benefits to the Town for each alternate, including, but not limited to, the quality of service to be provided to the citizens of Jonesville, and to award the contract to the low responsible Proposer for the service alternate selected by the Town.

Firms who desire to submit a proposal for the Town's consideration for the services described herein are invited to request a *Bid Meeting to be held in the Town Hall meeting room, which is located at 104 Lilly Street, Jonesville, LA, at a date and time to be determined at the time of the request.*

Any revisions to this RFP that may become necessary shall be in the form of an Addendum, and shall be issued by the Town of Jonesville not later than 72 hours prior to the time specified below for receipt of proposals.

Proposals shall be submitted to Ms. Anlyne Gardner, Jonesville Town Clerk, by 3:00 P.M., October 15, 2021. Proposals shall be delivered to Town Hall, 104 Lilly Street, Jonesville, LA 71343, or mailed to the same address. Alternatively, scanned signed proposals may be e-mailed to agardner@jonesvillela.com. **Regardless of the delivery method, all submittals shall be clearly marked, "2021 Winter Storm Debris Collection and Transport," with the contract number shown above.** If delivery is made by mail or carrier service, care should be exercised to ensure that the delivery is made by the deadline stated above. **No proposal will be accepted if received by the Town Clerk after the deadline stated above, for any reason.**

For purposes of this RFP, a proposal is defined as completion of Pages 3 and 4 of this document, with proposed lump sum price clearly marked in dollars and cents, along with name and address of firm, Louisiana license number, signature of person submitting the bid, and date submitted.

Proposals should consider collection of four thousand cubic yards (4000 cu yds) of "vegetative debris" located at two (2) sites: Site 1, 900 cu yds, at GPS coordinates Lat. 31.623418 degrees North, Lon. 091.832143 degrees West; and Site 2, 3100 cu yds, at GPS coordinates Lat. 31.618483 degrees North, Lon. 091.818043 degrees West, and the transport of said debris to the Collection Site at Harrisonburg, Louisiana. The Proposer should include pricing to provide and furnish at its costs any and all labor, equipment, machinery, transportation, tools, materials and supplies necessary to perform the services in connection with the collection and transport of the debris.

It is an absolute requirement that the vegetative debris collected in connection with this contract not be mixed, combined, or otherwise commingled with any other form of trash, waste, or debris, during or in the process of its collection and/or transport.
